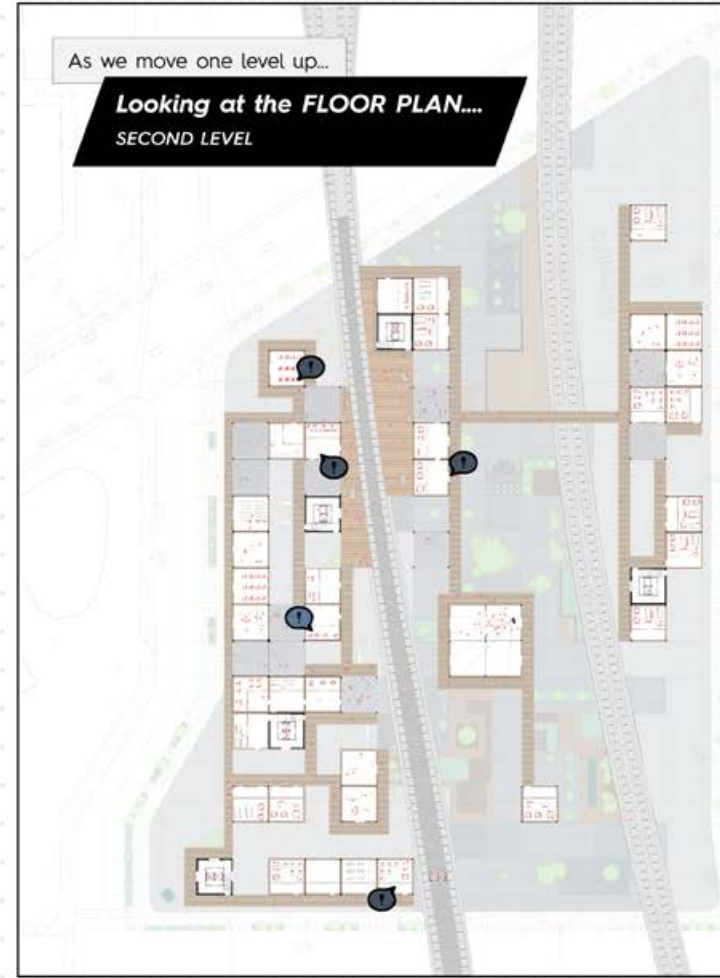
Looking at the FLOOR PLAN....

SECOND LEVEL



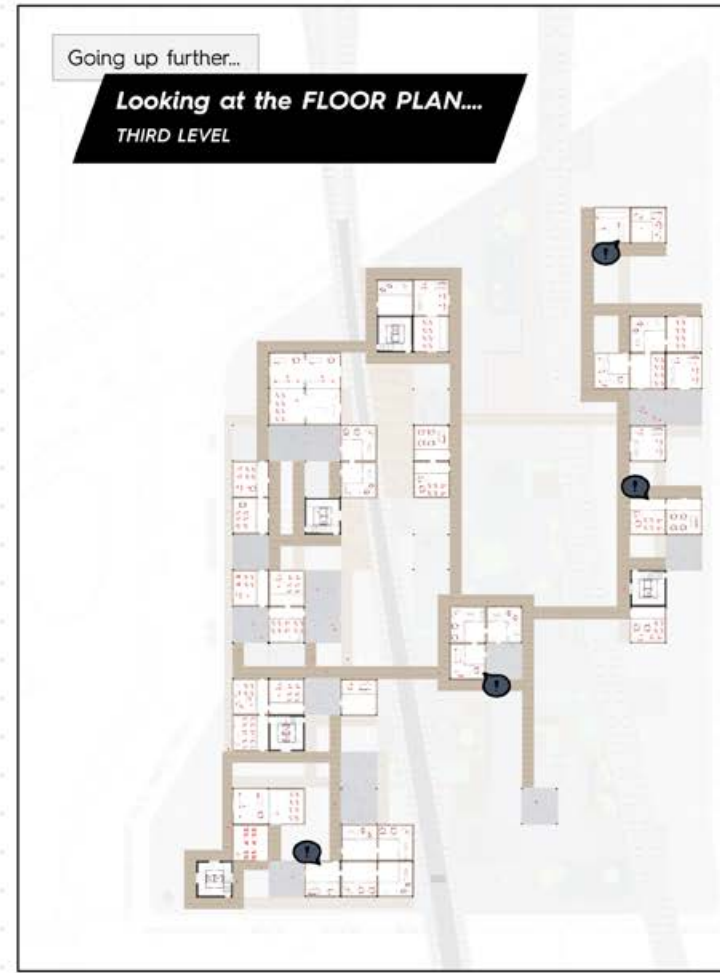

From here we get a glimpse into the most user specific area of Giga Village... where **digital programs** and facilities aim to support the growing needs of the neighborhood and offer opportunities...

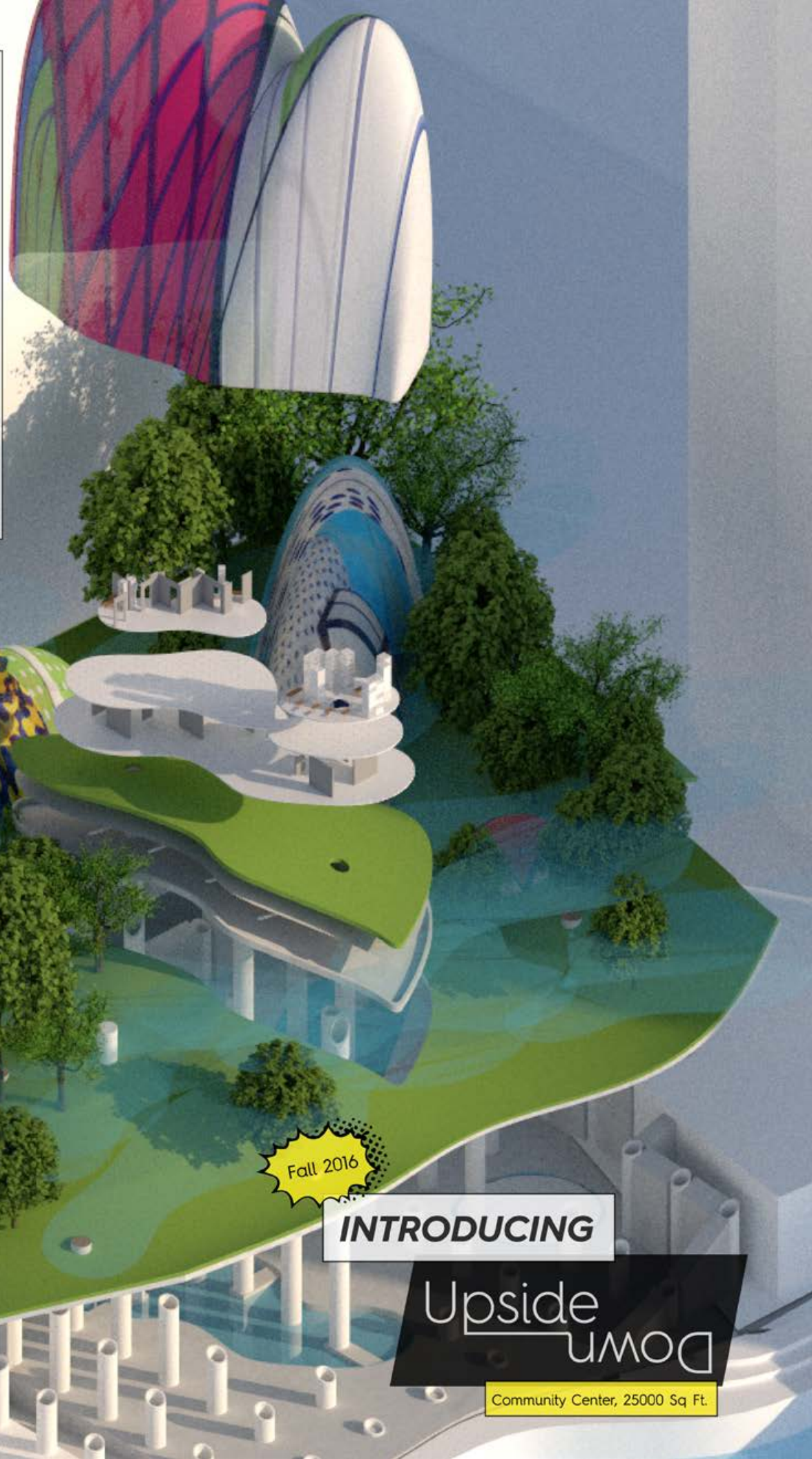

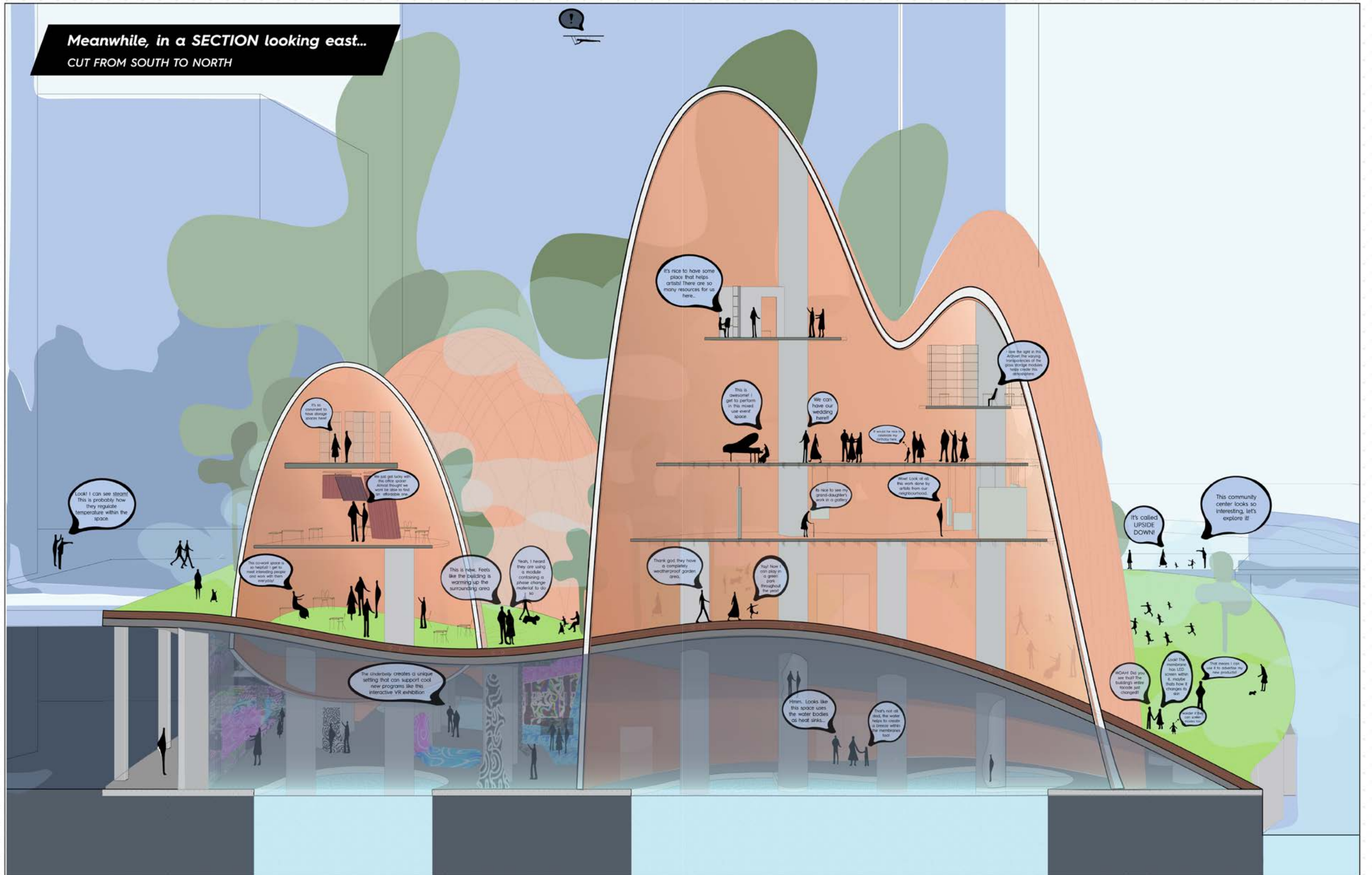

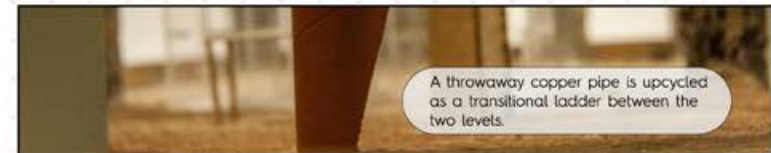
Furniture made in collaboration with **Vidisha Aggarwal**. Pillows designed and fabricated by **Sabrina Yang**.



The condition of the old **concrete** columns is preserved while recovering its structural integrity by adding **resin** to fill the damaged parts.

Drawing inspiration from themes such as **historic preservation** and beauty of integrity, this **massive old post office** is **re-imagined** as an **old, deserted building** that has been drastically affected by time and lack of proper care. It is treated as a **ruin which would be re-activated by a new set of programs**.

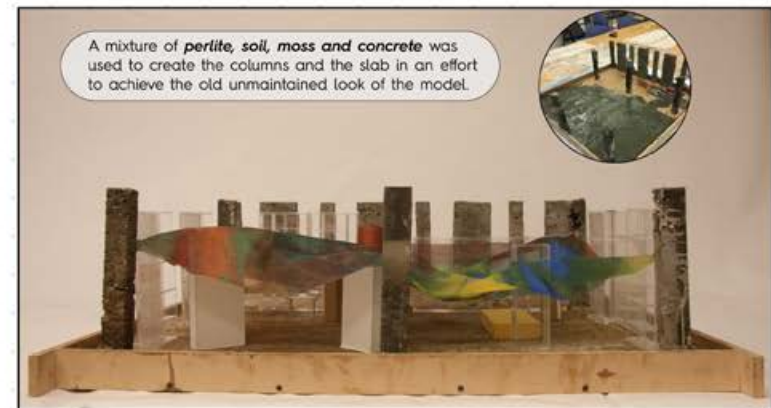
With well articulated and intentional material choices this **model presents us an interpretation of what life might look and feel like** within Multiple Singularity. It celebrates and cherishes the past of this landmark building while also looking towards a new lease of life.



A throwaway copper pipe is upcycled as a transitional ladder between the two levels.



The **hammock** and the **elements** in the level help facilitate this **super fluid, translucent almost seamless lifestyle**.



A mixture of **perlite, soil, moss and concrete** was used to create the columns and the slab in an effort to achieve the old unmaintained look of the model.



The extruded storage volumes penetrate the hammock giving rise to a new landscape or the **hammockscape**.



The concrete columns, extruded shapes with assorted **surface treatments (cork board, white board, softboard, projection screen)** along with the furniture and mobile translucent storage units with different light filters help **curate the experience within the space**.

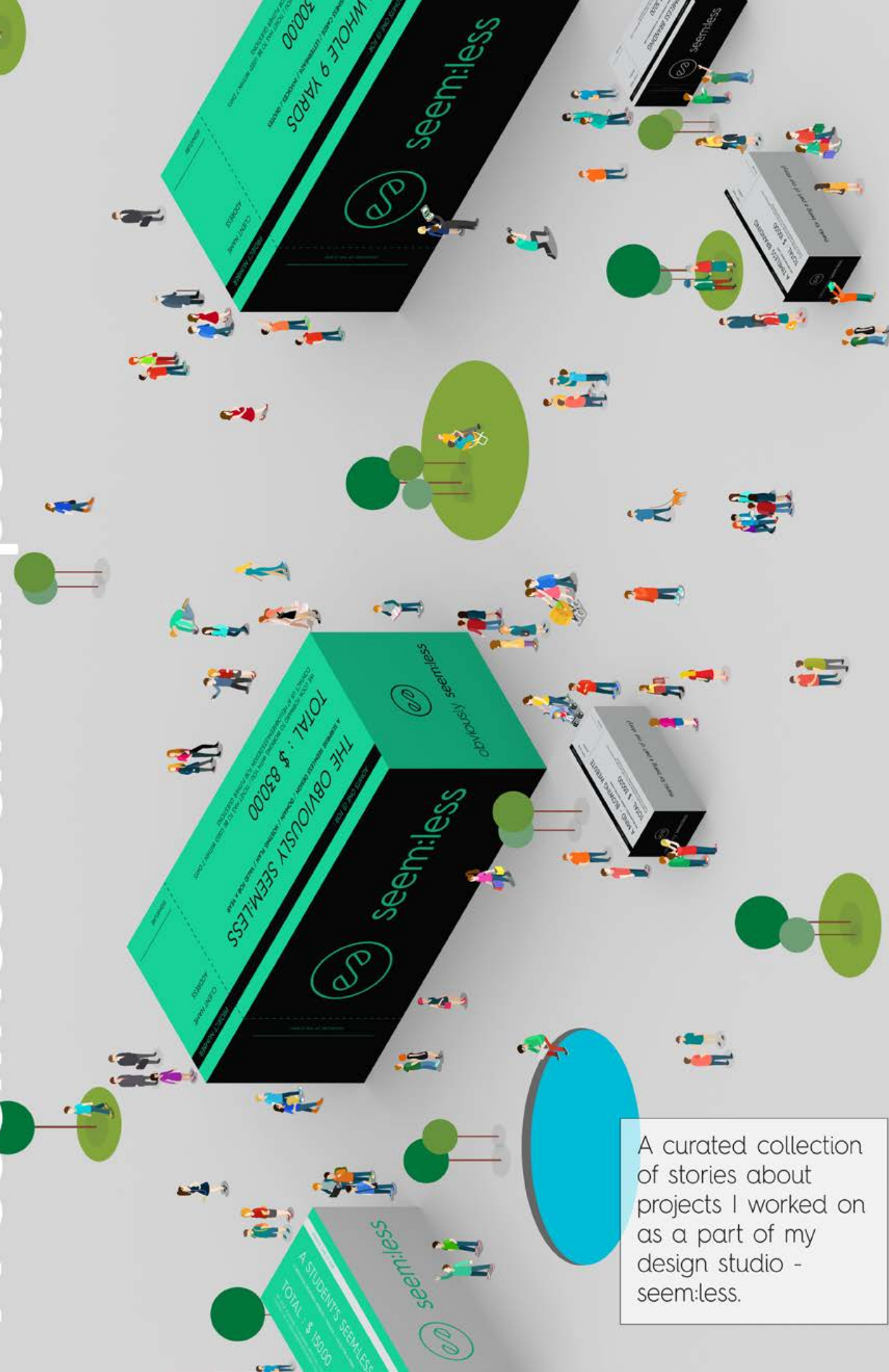


The hammockscape allows for **new interactions** between what were two divided programs.



They also allow Multiple Singularity to function as a highly fluid and flexible space that gives total freedom to the users.

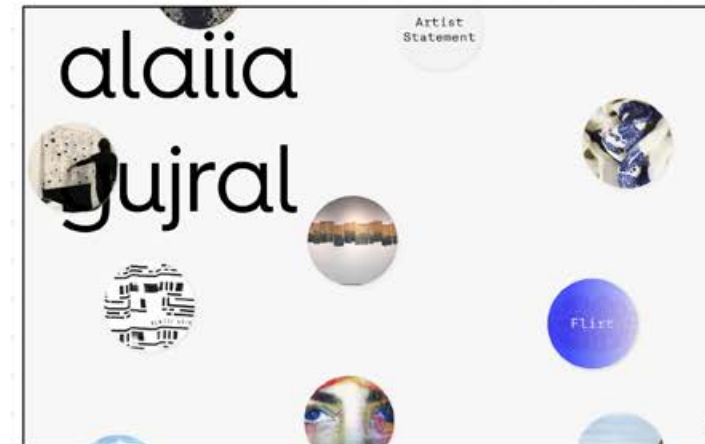

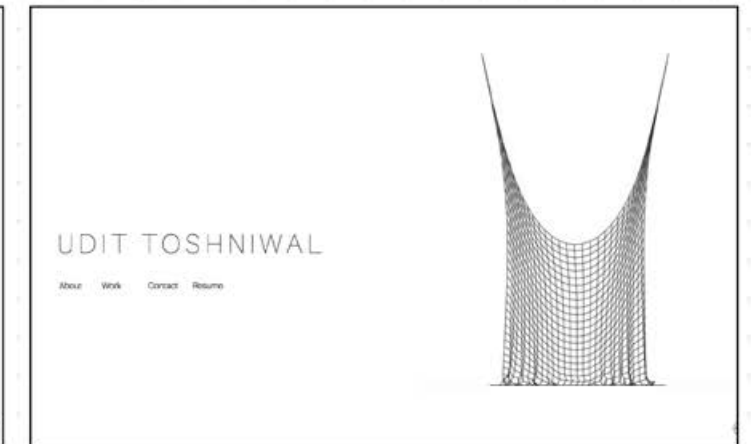

Indicator Jacket

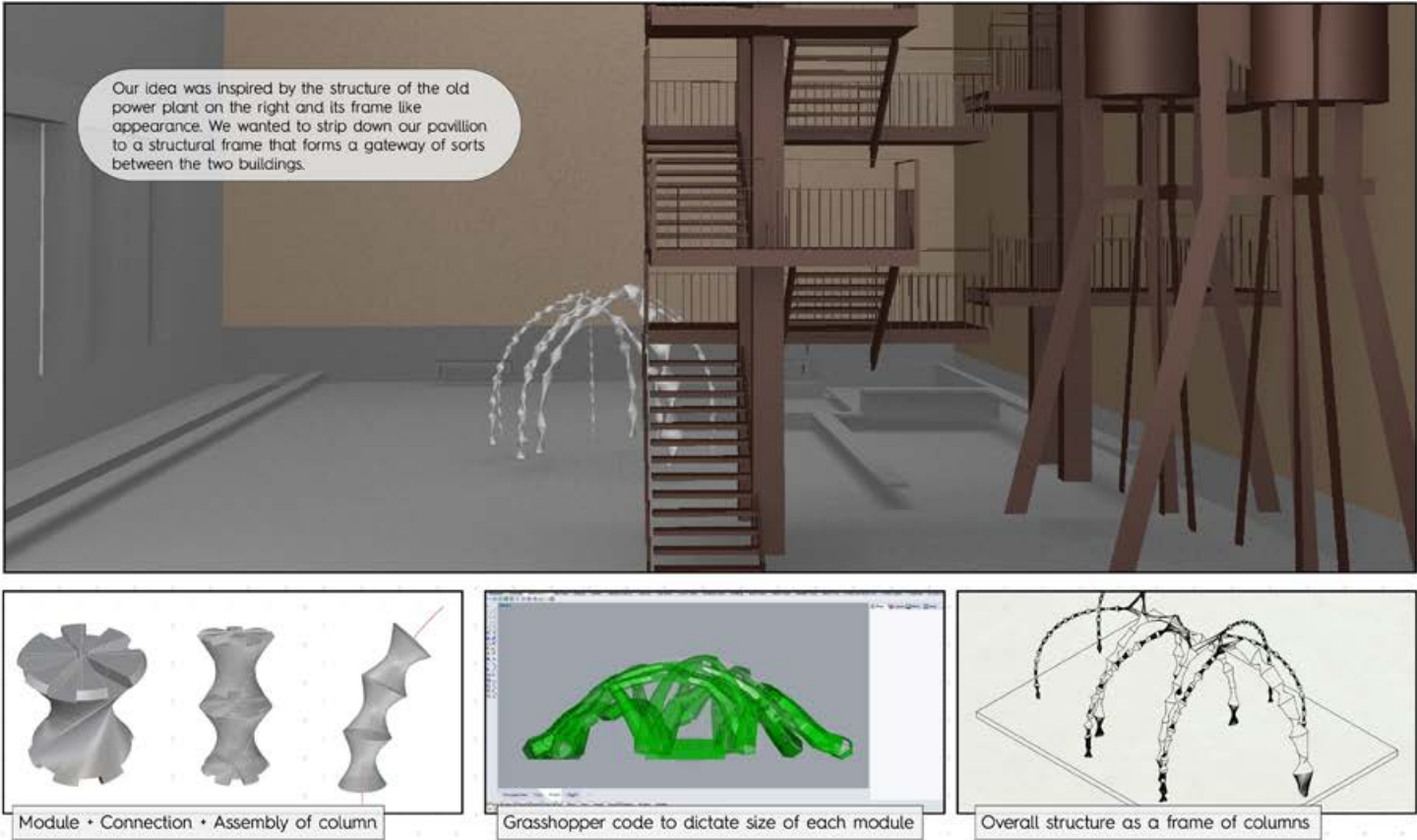
A jacket for pedestrians and cyclists to increase their safety on roads. Helps indicate their prescence better.

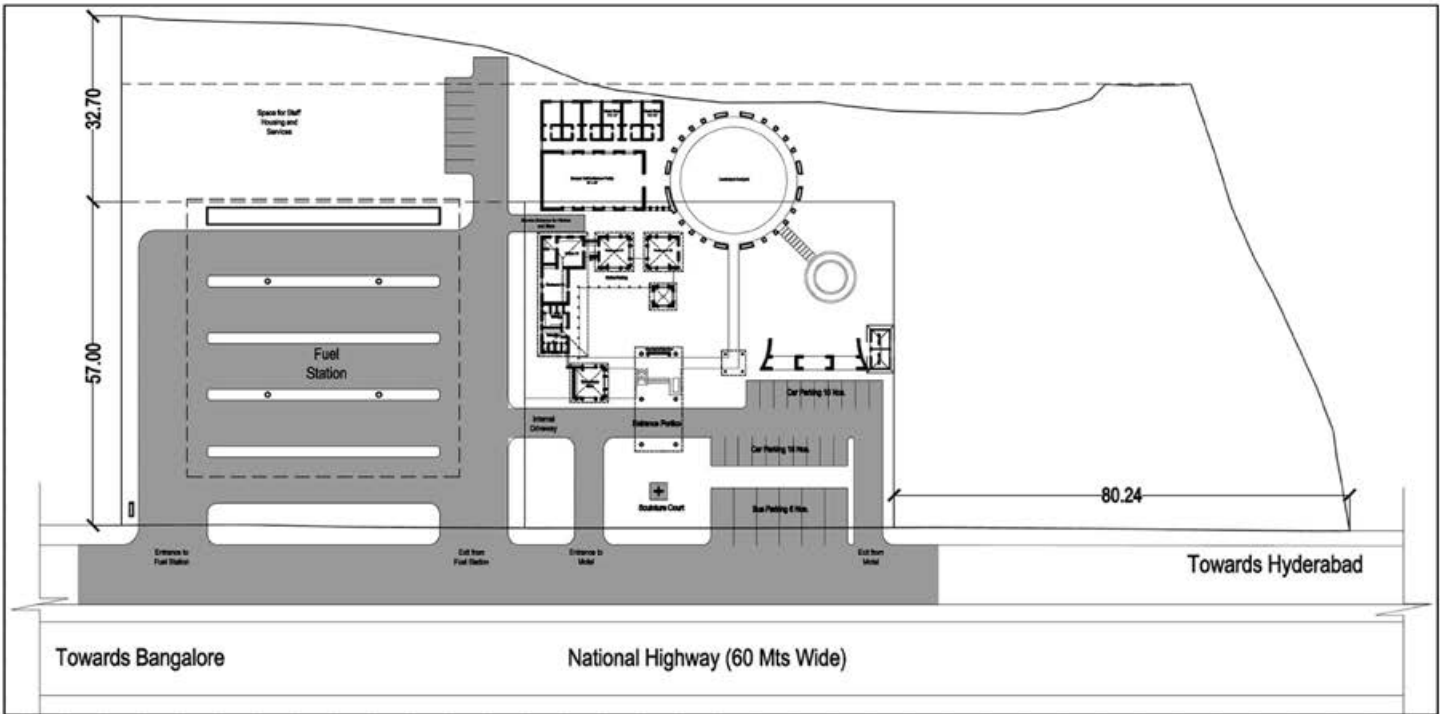
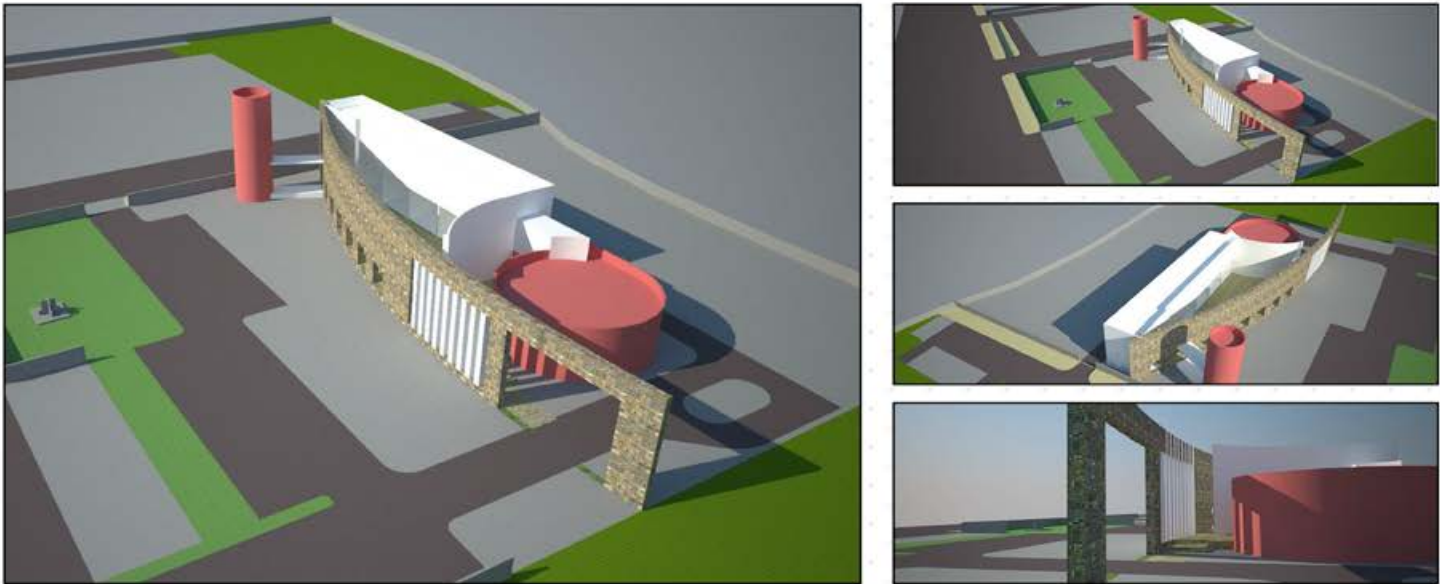

Thoughts on spatial fluidity in contemporary sacred architecture.

Abstract

The paper responds to the idea that religious architecture can transcend the boundaries of the religion and act as an open, inclusive space for communities. The paper argues that in the *flat world* that we are living in, coexistence of different cultures and religions is inevitable and Architecture has a huge role to play in how seamless this coexistence is. The permeability of sacred architecture is explored in terms of its opacity. The paper argues that although we can say that we are a truly global world, the interactions within various communities are not as seamless as they could be and that Architecture has a potentially important role to play in enabling a more diverse and accepting sense of community. It is argued that Houses of Gods still stand as walls between different cultures, even though they exist in the same communities and that these opaque, rigid walls must evolve into translucent, semi-permeable membranes in order for communities to become more inclusive. Taking this one step further the paper also questions the possibility of a single architectural space capable of facilitating different religions and beliefs in the future.

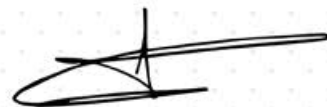
I taught Seetharam Vallabhaneni during his 3rd year undergraduate architecture studio at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. The studio took place between September and December of 2016.

During the studio, students were tasked to design an art/ community center along the main branch of the Chicago River while addressing physical and non-physical conditions of the city. Each of them was asked to explore new representation techniques, conduct research, and increase the sophistication of their approach to design and formal analysis. Seetharam's work as part of the studio addressed all of these aspects, taking the initial studio brief and complementing it with his personal interest in technology, environmental conditions, sustainability, and graphic representation. It was an ambitious project that, while not completely resolved (as expected in the third design studio of their career), outlined the willingness to tackle complex issues in a comprehensive way and explore it through the lens of design. 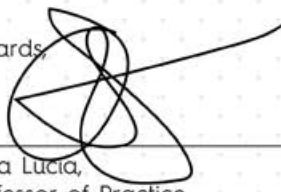
